Mission (Eclipse Bylaw - 1.1 Purpose)

The Eclipse technology is a vendor-neutral, open development platform supplying frameworks and exemplary, extensible tools (the “Eclipse Platform”). Eclipse Platform tools are exemplary in that they verify the utility of the Eclipse frameworks, illustrate the appropriate use of those frameworks, and support the development and maintenance of the Eclipse Platform itself; Eclipse Platform tools are extensible in that their functionality is accessible via documented programmatic interfaces. **The purpose of Eclipse Foundation Inc., (the “Eclipse Foundation”), is to advance the creation, evolution, promotion, and support of the Eclipse Platform and to cultivate both an open source community and an ecosystem of complementary products, capabilities, and services.** The Eclipse Foundation is formed exclusively as a non-profit trade association, as set out in section 501 (c) (6) of the Internal Revenue Code (the “Code”).

Iterative process for the Committee



Activities

- All board members provide input to strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats (SWOT) of the Foundation
- Consolidation of the SWOTS by the Committee
- Generate potential strategic initiatives for each identified opportunity, threat and weaknesses
- Prioritize strategic potential initiatives by “value for the Foundation” and “effort to implement”
- Develop a recommendation for a number of strategic initiatives of high priority for the Board
- Board makes decision which strategic initiative is going to be implemented

Deliverables

- Consolidated list of strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, threats (S.W.O.T.s)
- Prioritized list of potential strategic initiatives for the Foundation
- Decision on strategic initiatives of the Foundation
